HIV PRE-EXPOSURE PROPHYLAXIS IN PRACTICE

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Australasian Society for HIV, Viral Hepatitis and Sexual Health Medicine

- Pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) is the use of antiretroviral drugs by HIV-negative individuals to prevent HIV infection.
- Clinical trials have shown PrEP is safe and effective.
- As of 6 May 2016 Truvada is licensed by the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) for use as PrEP.
- Patients who are prescribed PrEP need regular monitoring and support.

EFFECTIVENESS

PrEP consists of tenofovir disoproxil fumarate (TDF) and emtricitabine (FTC) and is marketed as 'Truvada' by Gilead. Both clinical trials and real-world use have shown that when taken daily, PrEP is highly effective at preventing HIV. The effectiveness of PrEP has been shown in research with men who have sex with men, heterosexuals and injecting drug users. Based on research findings, the US Food and Drug Administration approved PrEP in June 2014.

WHO PrEP IS FOR?

PrEP is meant to be used for people who are at high risk of acquiring HIV. The Australasian Society of HIV, Viral Hepatitis and Sexual Health Medicine (ASHM) provides advice when recommending PrEP:

SIDE EFFECTS

In the first few weeks of use, PrEP users may experience headache, abdominal pain, and weight loss.

In the long term, a small percentage of people may experience a loss of bone mineral density (BMD). The significance of this is uncertain as studies found no increase in bone fractures during the following 1-2 years. In addition, the loss of BMD was reversible when PrEP was stopped; however longer term data is needed.

A decrease in kidney function has been observed in a small proportion of participants in PrEP studies and in some cases required them to stop taking PrEP. Kidney function usually improves on stopping tenofovir.

PrEP IN AUSTRALIA

Truvada is not currently subsidised by the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) for preventative use. An application is underway for a PBS listing. Patients seeking PrEP in NSW can do so by participating in clinical trials (e.g. EPIC, see below), purchasing off-label from an Australian pharmacy (about \$13,500 a year) or importing generic drugs from overseas (about \$1,300 a year).



EPIC NSW

EPIC NSW is a clinical trial giving PrEP access to 3,700 individuals at high risk of HIV infection. Enrolment began in March 2016.

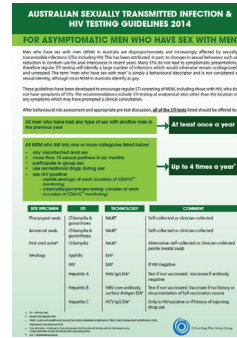

STI TESTING GUIDELINES FOR MSM

Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) Testing Guidelines for Men Who Have Sex with Men (MSM) have been developed to encourage regular STI screening of MSM, including those with HIV, who do not have symptoms of STIs.

HIV TESTING WEEK 1-7 JUNE

1-7 June is NSW HIV Testing Week and aims to raise awareness of the importance of HIV testing. Increased testing improves the chance of early diagnosis, which leads



to better individual health and reduced chance of onward transmission. HIV Testing Week was first held in 2013 in response to a 24% increase in HIV notifications from 2011 to 2012.

'PrEP in practice: Guidance for GPs'
